1. Approve the proposed park improvement project (Project) at Travel Town in Griffith Park, consisting of the installation of an educational sign regarding the Griffith Park Internment Camp as more fully described in this Report and as shown in Attachments 1 and 2 of this Report, to be installed in Travel Town at the location specified in Attachment 4 of this Report ("Improvements");

- 2. Authorize the Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) Planning, Maintenance, and Construction Branch (PMC), upon the Project's approval from the Board of Recreation and Parks Commissioners (Board), to issue a Right of Entry Permit (ROE) to the Los Angeles Parks Foundation and it's selected contractor, Great Western Installations, authorizing the installation of the Improvements;
- 3. Accept the Improvements valued up to approximately \$4,600, subject to a post-completion inspection of the installed Improvements by PMC staff, as a donation to the Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) from the Griffith J. Griffith Charitable Foundation and the Los Angeles Parks Foundation;
- 4. Determine that the Project is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Article III, Section 1, Class 11(5)

- 5. Authorize RAP's Chief Accounting Employee to prepare a check to the Los Angeles County Clerk in the amount of Seventy Five Dollars (\$75.00) for the purpose of filing the NOE;
- 6. Authorize RAP staff to make technical corrections as necessary to carry out the intent of this Report.

SUMMARY

The area in Griffith Park now known as Travel Town was once home to a Civilian Conservation Camp. Like other camps located throughout the country, it was purposed to meet a wartime need for internment camps. In December 1941, the day after the Pearl Harbor attack, Griffith Park was allocated \$32,400 by the War Department to build a campsite. Griffith Park was designated as a Prisoner of War Enclosure known as the Griffith Park Internment Camp. Immigration and Naturalization Service used Griffith Park to detain small groups of first-generation immigrants. Approximately 101 Japanese, 21 Germans and 4 Italians were detained for periods of one night to several months during World War II. The Army closed this site in 1943 as the need for military guards increased throughout the war effort and were deployed elsewhere. Long term detention never occurred at the Griffith Park Civilian Conservation Camp site; however, this location is historically significant to Griffith Park and the City of Los Angeles

In recognition of this history, the Los Angeles Parks Foundation has received a generous donation from the Griffith J. Griffith Charitable Foundation consisting of an educational sign which will be placed on a pedestal to be installed at Travel Town. A rendering of the sign and the pedestal as well as where the sign will be installed at Travel Town is set forth in Attachments 1, 2 and 4 respectively. The sign and the pedestal has the following characteristics:

- Custom-High Pressure Laminate panels with matte finish
- 1/8" (inch) thick exterior panel
- 24" (inches) in height
- 36" (inches) in width
- Standard eased edge .03" (inch) rounded radius corners
- Double cantilever pedestal (45-degree angle)
- 54" (inch) tall posts from the ground to top of sign
- In-ground mount
- Black powder coat

The narrative for this sign was provided by Dr. Russ Endo, Professor of Ethnic Studies, University of Colorado and is also supported by Travel Town Museum Foundation, Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition, and the Japanese American National Museum. This project was shared with The Griffith Park Advisory Board to provide community engagement. Letters of support for the proposed project are attached to this report in full support.

TREES AND SHADE

There is no impact to shade or trees.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT

The proposed Project consists of installation of signs located on City property managed by a City department which has a sign policy adopted by its Board of Commissioners.

According to the parcel profile report retrieved March 10, 2023 this area does not reside within a coastal or methane zone, but it is located in a liquefaction zone. The construction of this Project will not create conditions that could lead to liquefaction.

Therefore, there is no reasonable possibility that the proposed Project may impact on an environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern or have a significant effect due to unusual circumstances. No other known projects would involve cumulatively significant impacts. and no future projects would result from the proposed Project. As of March 10, 2023, the State Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) (Envirostor at www.envirostor.dtsc.ca.gov) and State Water Resources Control Board (SWCB) (Geotracker the https://geotracker.waterboards.ca.gov/) have listed the Project site as N. 80000257, because In August, 1943, the area became the Army's Western Corps Photographic Center and Camouflage Experimental Laboratory The installation of the sign, however, will create a significant hazard to the public. According to the Caltrans Scenic Highway Map there is no scenic highway located within the vicinity of the proposed Project or within its site. Although the proposed Project is located within Griffith Park, an historic cultural monument of the City of Los Angeles (HCM#942). Specifically, Travel Town has been recognized as an Historic Cultural Monument (HCM #474) as well. However, the installation of a sign that memorializes the historic role of that space, will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of any historical resource.

Based in this information, staff recommends that the Board determine that it is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Article III, Section 1, Class 11(5) of City CEQA Guidelines as well as to Article 19, Section 15311(a) of California CEQA Guidelines. Staff will file a Notice of Exemption with the Los Angeles County Clerk upon Board's approval.

During World War II, before the mass incarceration of West Coast Japanese Americans, thousands of Japanese, German, and Italian immigrant leaders were confined without due process in U.S. detention and internment camps as suspected threats to national security.


One internment camp, operated by the Army, was in Griffith Park at the site of the former Civilian Conservation Corps Camp Riverside. From February 1942 to July 1943, this internment camp held small numbers of men for brief periods of time until they could be moved to other camps away from the West Coast.

The Griffith Park Camp consisted of two separate but adjoining areas enclosed by two ten-foot fences topped with barbed wire. Initially, one enclosure had three portable CCC barracks that could accommodate 150 individuals. Later, 50 Army pyramidal tents were added to the second enclosure to accommodate 400 additional people.

The Army retained control of this property until 1947. Today it is the home of the Travel Town Museum and the Los Angeles Live Steamers.

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

Dear Commissioners,

Griffith Park has an undeniably rich and often storied history, which should be available and accessible to all users of the park. Over the past year, Recreation and Parks staff has done an amazing job identifying locations and narratives of historical significance to be highlighted through educational and informational signs throughout the park. We applied this effort to bring both the positive and complicated stories to life.

During World War II, thousands of Japanese, German, and Italian immigrant leaders were confined without due process in US detention and internment camps as suspected threats to national security. One such camp, operated by the Army, resided in Griffith Park at the site of the former Civilian Conservation Corps Camp Riverside, now home to Travel Town Museum and Los Angeles Live Steamers. For more than a year, this small camp, which could accommodate over 500 people, served as a staging area for larger camps in other parts of the country.

While this shameful part of our nation's history is problematic, we applaud the effort to acknowledge it and educate visitors. Shining a light on our park's role in this sad chapter will enhance the experience of visitors by deepening the public's understanding of its history. We strongly support the signage proposal for the Griffith Park Internment Camp and look forward to seeing more proposals for educational signage brought forward by Recreation and Parks staff and others who are knowledgeable about the park's history.

Dear Commissioners:

I am an emeritus professor of sociology and Asian American studies at the University of Colorado (Denver and Boulder). Among my other primary affiliations are the Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition, Amache Alliance, and the Association for Asian American Studies.

I am writing in support of the proposed Griffith Park Internment Camp sign. During World War II and under the authority of Presidential Proclamations, thousands of Japanese, German, and Italian immigrant leaders were incarcerated without due process as potential threats to national security. Since 2016, I have been researching such individuals from Southern California. Over the past year, Griffith Park historian Linda Barth and I have pieced together the story of the Griffith Park camp using hundreds of pages of documents. This work provides the basis for the material on the proposed sign.

Across the U.S., immigrant leaders were confined in dozens of sites. Many have been given historic status or other visible identification. Recognition of such sites provides an opportunity to educate the public about the importance of protecting everyone's rights and freedom, especially in times of national crisis.

In Southern California, Griffith Park was one of just three primary incarceration sites and the only one operated by the U.S. Army. This site is an integral part of the history of Griffith Park, Los Angeles, and indeed the United States. It is well-deserving of the proposed informational sign.



The Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition wholeheartedly supports the proposed Griffith Park Internment Camp historical sign.


The purpose of the Coalition is to illuminate the U.S. Government's World War II incarceration of Japanese, German, and Italian immigrants and others at Tuna Canyon Detention Station so that such injustice is never again experienced by any The Coalition partners with many organizations that support our mission, including the Japanese American National Museum, Manzanar Committee, San Fernando Valley Japanese American Community Center, Tule Lake Committee, and Japanese American Citizens League-Southwest District.

The Tuna Canyon Detention Station, located in Tujunga, has a close relationship with the Griffith Park Internment Camp. The first Griffith Park prisoners were Japanese immigrant leaders confined there temporarily under the supervision of Tuna Canyon Officer-in-Charge Merrill Scott. Many subsequent Griffith Park prisoners were transferred from Tuna Canyon. Because of concerns about internal security, the U.S. Army wanted individuals arrested by the FBI to be moved away from the Pacific Coast. In Southern California, Tuna Canyon and Griffith Park were critical for such plans.

Tuna Canyon has been designated as Los Angeles Cultural Historical Monument #1039 by the City of Los Angeles. One of the Coalition's initial plans is to install a plaque at this site. Plaques and signs, such as the one proposed for Griffith Park will remind visitors of this dark period and are important because we believe that it should not happen again to anyone, anywhere.

We advocate for the plaque because vigilance is critical or history may repeat itself.
