RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board:

1. Approve the request of C. S. Legacy Construction, Inc., to discontinue withholding further retention on all subsequently approved payment claims on the Sepulveda Basin Sports Complex – Phase I (PRJ1400S) (W.O. #E170217F) project, Contract No. 3317; and,
2. Direct the Board Secretary to notify all interested parties regarding said discontinuation of retention.

SUMMARY:

The Department is in receipt of a request from C. S. Legacy Construction, Inc., contractor for the Sepulveda Basin Sports Complex – Phase I (PRJ1400S) (W.O. #E170217F) project, Contract No. 3317, to discontinue withholding further retention for all subsequently approved payment claims as the project is more than 50% complete, per General Requirements, Article 20 (D). The current construction contract amount, including change orders, is \$9,429,458.00. To date, the total retention funds withheld are \$903,048.85. The project is now 90% complete in construction.

Pursuant to Division 01 – General Requirements, Section 20.D.1 and D.2 of the contract, which states, “D.1 – Retention of ten percent (10%) will be held on the original contract value of each approved payment claim until the amount paid of the original contract equals fifty percent (50%). The City may then, at its sole discretion discontinue further retention on the original contract value

for all subsequently approved payment claims” and that “D.2 – At anytime during the course of the contract, the City may, at its sole discretion, reinstate the ten percent (10%) retention.” This conforms to standard practice on construction contracts.

The contractor has satisfactorily completed 90% of the original contract price, and all further pay requests will be for change orders that have been agreed upon by all the parties. In addition, the Bureau of Engineering (BOE) Project Manager recommends that this request be honored, as C. S. Legacy Construction, Inc., is in good standing and moving forward with this project.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT:

There is no fiscal impact to the Department’s General Fund as the monies involved are already appropriated to this contract.



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

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That the Board:

1. Rescind its approval of three independent Agreements, (i) between the City of Los Angeles and Ocean View Farms, Inc., a California non-profit corporation (Report No. 11-245); (ii) between the City of Los Angeles and Youth Speak Collective, a California non-profit corporation (Report No. 11-246); and, (iii) between the City of Los Angeles and Wattles Farm and Neighborhood Gardeners, Inc., a California non-profit corporation (Report No. 11-247); due to the inclusion of a "Hold-over" provision in each of the subject agreements, which pursuant to a subsequent review of each document by the Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO) in accordance with Mayor's Directive No. 3, was found to be inappropriate;
2. Approve the proposed revised Agreements, substantially in the form on file in the Board Office, between the City of Los Angeles and Ocean View Farms, Inc., a California non-profit corporation, setting forth the terms and conditions for the continued operation and maintenance of the Ocean View Farms Community Garden by Ocean View Farms, Inc., subject to the approval of the Mayor, and of the City Attorney as to form;
3. Approve the proposed revised Agreement, substantially in the form on file in the Board Office, between the City of Los Angeles and Youth Speak Collective, a California non-profit corporation, setting forth the terms and conditions for the continued operation and maintenance of the Roger Jessup Community Garden by Youth Speak Collective, subject to the approval of the Mayor, and of the City Attorney as to form;

4. Approve the proposed revised Agreement, substantially in the form on file in the Board Office, between the City of Los Angeles and Wattles Farm and Neighborhood Gardeners, Inc., a California non-profit corporation, setting forth the terms and conditions for the continued operation and maintenance of the Wattles Farm Community Garden by Wattles Farm and Neighborhood Gardeners, Inc., subject to the approval of the Mayor, and of the City Attorney as to form;
5. Direct the Board Secretary to transmit the proposed revised Agreements, to the Mayor in accordance with Executive Directive No. 3, and concurrently, to the City Attorney for review and approval as to form;
6. Authorize the Board President and Secretary to execute the Agreements upon receipt of the necessary approvals; and,
7. Direct the Department's Chief Accounting Employee to deposit fees and utility and other cost recovery reimbursements received pursuant to these Agreements in the accounts established for such purpose.

SUMMARY:

On September 7, 2011, the Board approved three proposed independent and separate Agreements with operators of three community gardens, each respectively setting forth the terms and conditions for the operation and maintenance of three community gardens: Ocean View Farms, Inc., for the Ocean View Farms Community Garden (Report No. 11-245); Youth Speak Collective, for the Roger Jessup Community Garden (Report No. 11-246); and, Wattles Farm and Neighborhood Gardeners, Inc., for the Wattles Farm Community Garden (Report No. 11-247).

Each Agreement contains substantially similar terms. Following the Board's approval, the Agreements were transmitted to the Mayor in accordance with Executive Directive No. 3, for review and approval. The CAO reviewed the agreements on behalf of the Mayor and advised that the Agreements could not be approved unless the "Holdover" clause in Section 2.d. (Term) of each Agreement was removed. The reason given for the removal of the holdover clause was that the clause would have effectively extended the term beyond the Agreement's original approved three-year term (Term), as upon expiration of the Term the Agreement would continue on a month to month basis indefinitely.

As a result of the CAO recommendations, staff removed the holdover clause from the original version of the Board approved Agreements and is now submitting revised versions of the three Agreements for the Board's consideration and approval. All other terms, conditions, and provisions remain exactly the same. This holdover clause has not been included in later Agreements for community gardens, subsequently approved by the Board.



RECOMMENDATIONS:

That the Board:

1. Authorize the Department's Chief Accounting Employee to transfer \$500,000 from Golf Operation Account 89G401, Fund 52H, Department 89, to Recreation and Parks (RAP) General Fund, Fund 302, Department 88, to support RAP operations;
2. Authorize the Department's Chief Accounting Employee to transfer \$2,142,329 from Golf Operation Account 89G401, Fund 52H, Department 89, to Golf Division's Capital Improvement Account 89G402, Fund 52H, Department 89, to fund golf capital improvement projects; and
3. Authorize the Department's Chief Accounting Employee to make necessary technical corrections.

SUMMARY:

On July 1, 2010, the City of Los Angeles (City), Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP), Golf Division ceased receiving RAP General Fund support and began operating as a self-sustaining Division within the Department of Recreation and Parks. The Golf Division became responsible for all costs, including indirect costs, related to the operations and maintenance of the

City's fourteen (14) golf facilities. The Golf Division also no longer receives City subsidy for its operations.

I. About the Golf Division

The Golf Division maintains and operates seven 18-hole golf courses, three 9-hole golf courses, two 9-hole pitch and putt golf courses, an 18-hole pony course and a golf training academy. The training academy provides golf instruction to youth under the age of eighteen and performs significant outreach to inner city, underprivileged children. The 18-hole pony course is located within Holmby Park and the Golf Division staff is responsible for maintenance of the golf course as well as bowling greens, children's play area, and the park's grounds.

City employees perform all maintenance, starter, and electric cart duties on each golf facility. In October and November 2011 the Golf Division also began self-operation of the driving ranges at Rancho Park and Woodley Lakes Golf Courses. Concessionaires provide pro shop, driving range and lessons services at Sepulveda Golf Complex (Encino/Balboa), Griffith Golf Complex (Wilson/Harding), and Hansen Dam Golf Course as well as food and beverage services at most golf facilities. The Golf Division currently is authorized 143 full-time and 250 part-time employees. All salary costs, including indirect costs of employees, are funded through revenue generated by the Golf Division. The Golf Division also funds all utility, supplies and contract services expenses related to Golf.

II. Challenges of First Year's Operation as a Special Fund

The Golf Division began self-sustaining operations as a Special Fund on July 1, 2010. On January 1, 2011, Golf Division employees began self operation of the electric golf cart rental fleet at all 18-hole golf courses, previously provided by a concessionaire who gave its vacate notice. Electric golf cart services were provided with pre-owned golf carts, operating at approximately 60% of the fleet normally available. At busier facilities, such as Griffith Park and Rancho Park, many times golf carts were sold out by 9:00 a.m., leading to decreased revenue not only related to golf cart rentals but also green fees, as many patrons chose not to play a round of golf without a golf cart. A new fleet of 500 golf carts began in June 2011.

On March 20, 2011, the Sepulveda Basin golf courses (Encino, Balboa and Woodley Lakes) were flooded due to heavy rain. As a consequence, the three courses were closed for several days and the Encino Golf Course operated as a 9-hole facility for six weeks during cleanup and refurbishment. The closure of the golf courses and interruption in service led to decreased revenue and increased costs of the cleanup, including extensive fence repairs.

III. Golf Revenue

Despite the challenges of the first year of operation, the Golf Division generated net income of \$2,642,329 for Fiscal Year 2010-11, before any reimbursements to the Department (Attachment A). Through significant cost cutting measures, income generation was achieved, which included reassigning fifteen golf employees to other special funded projects in the Department and holding ten or more position vacancies throughout the year. Of the \$2,642,329, it is proposed that \$500,000 be reimbursed to the RAP General Fund, Fund 302, Department 88 to support RAP operations. It is proposed that the remaining \$2,142,329 be transferred to Golf's capital improvement Account 89G402, Fund 52H, Department 89, to help fund necessary golf related capital projects.

IV. Electric Golf Carts

In March 2010 the Golf Division began collecting golf cart revenue at the starter's window. Previously, golf cart fees had been collected by the concessionaire at the cart barn. On January 1, 2011, the Golf Division began self operation of the golf cart services on the 18-hole golf courses. Operation commenced with a fleet of 340 pre-owned carts at the five cart locations, where the desired fleet for all five golf courses was 500 carts. Even with a smaller cart fleet, the Golf Division generated \$757,992 in net income from electric cart rentals between January 2011 and June 2011. In June 2011, the Golf Division leased 500 new Club Car golf carts. The net income generated was 59% of gross cart revenue, as compared to the 47% of gross revenue paid in rent to the City by the previous concessionaire. With the new fleet of carts, the Golf Division generated \$1,021,913 of net income (63% of gross revenue) related to golf cart operations from July 2011 to December 2011 (Attachment B).

V. Capital Improvement Program

Golf's capital improvement program includes a list of large and small projects to be completed within the next ten years (Attachment C). It is estimated that the Golf Division will require \$20.4 million in capital improvement funding in the next ten years. It is proposed that \$2.1 million be transferred to Golf's capital improvement Account 89G402, Fund 52H, Department 89, to help fund necessary golf related capital projects.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT:

There is no negative impact on the RAP General Fund, as all reimbursements and transfers will be paid from the Golf Operations Special Fund. Through its reimbursement to RAP, the Golf Division is contributing \$500,000 to the RAP General Fund.





RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board approve a sixth outdoor community event for 2012, with alcohol, in the Valley Region. This request is being made for “*The Balboa Music Festival*” to be held at Lake Balboa/Beilenson Park on September 15, 2012, subject to final approval of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACOE).

SUMMARY:

The Department of Recreation and Parks in partnership with music promoters Steven C. Gable and Eric Wilson have organized a one-day jazz festival at Lake Balboa in the Sepulveda Basin. The festival is being called “*The Balboa Music Festival*” and is estimated to draw an attendance of about 10,000 people. As part of the event/festival, it is intended that beer and wine be made available for those who wish to purchase it. The serving of beer and wine will be allowed only in a “beer garden” area, and will meet all State and local regulations, as well as the Board approved policy regarding alcohol. This event will also require approval of the USACOE. Department staff is working with the USACOE to submit all necessary documents for final approval of this event.

The event organizers have a long history of putting on successful events in the greater Los Angeles area, including the Martin Luther King Day Parade, the Compton Summer Soul Jam, A Taste of Soul, and the LA Kings African American Heritage Night. Security for this event will be provided by the Rodgers Protection Group, which has a history of supervising numerous events with alcohol sales.

The Board’s Alcohol Beverage Policy requires that a outdoor community event where alcoholic

beverages are sold, beyond the five events allowed per region, per calendar year, must obtain additional approval from the Board. The number of requests for alcohol-related special events in the Valley Region, this year, will exceed the Board pre-approved established policy limit of five. The five events already scheduled for the year are the World Fest, Valley Fest (previously known as Salute to Recreation), Valley Cultural Center, Watermelon Festival, and OctoberFest .

Both the Assistant General Manager of the Operations Branch, and the Council Office support this event, as well as the additional request to serve alcohol.

The Valley Region receives a large volume of permit requests each year for outdoor community events and festivals. This is mainly due to the numerous large venues available in the Valley Region for special events. Additionally, due to the recent re-organization, the Valley Region was joined with much of what was the former West Region, thus adding even more demand in the number of event permits requested each year.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT:

There is no fiscal impact to the Department's General Fund.
